



2021 DUNN COUNTY 4-H / FFA Swine Project Rules

1. Requirements:

- a. Entry into the Dunn County Meat Animal Swine Market Project begins by submitting completed and signed **Swine Project Entry Form and YQCA Certificate** to Tina Edwards via email (davetinaedwards@gmail.com) by **4:00 PM on MAY 15TH, 2021 (No Exceptions)**.

***PLEASE MAKE A COPY OF YOUR PAPERWORK OR PHOTOGRAPH PRIOR TO TURNING IT IN ON MAY 15TH FOR YOUR OWN RECORDS.**

- b. Swine must be born after **January 1** of the exhibit year.
- c. All animals must show obvious signs of castration.

2. Ear Tag / Identification/ Loss of Ear Tag: Each project animal is required to have a Dunn County 982 RFID ear tag. If an animal loses an ear tag, contact a Swine Superintendent. The ear tag will be replaced at the fair entry.

- a. Dates / locations to pick up tags will be announced separately.

3. Sale/Auction / Fair Weigh In: Swine must meet the minimum sale requirement weight of **235 lbs** to be eligible to sell in the auction and will be paid up to a maximum weight of 300 lbs. In the event the maximum number of animals to sell in the auction are met, Ultrasound scan results and/or Judge’s live grading results will be used to determine eligibility to sell. (Refer to the Meat Animal Project Entry Rules)

NOTE: In the event that carcass ultrasound data is not available, the committee will utilize judge’s live grading to establish eligibility for the auction. (Judges decisions are final)

- a. Weigh in will take place at 1:00 PM on Wednesday of the Dunn County Fair.
- b. Animals must be at the fair and penned one hour ahead of weigh in.

4. Helpful Tips

a. Selecting your animal

- i. Consider your breeder – purchasing from a breeder that has a reputation for selling quality animals and for being helpful will be in your best interest.
- ii. There are separate market classes for Purebred Gilts, Purebred Barrows, Crossbred Gilts and Crossbred Barrows
- iii. Consider showing gilts – gilts are generally leaner, which may benefit you in the carcass evaluation.
- iv. What size should your animal be? The animal’s weight will depend on when it was purchased and how fast it grows—there is no maximum weight; however, suggested weight mid-April is 45 to 85 pounds.

b. Getting your project animal ready for show

- i. Start working with your animal early – the earlier the better.
- ii. The more time that you spend with your animal, the more relaxed both of you will be in the show ring!
- iii. Never be afraid to ask questions.
