The Dunn County Fair Board reserves the right to interpret all rules and regulations. It is understood that each exhibitor at the Dunn County Fair subscribes to the rules and regulations found in the fair book.

Rules and regulations are subject to change due to State Legislative changes to ATPC 160 or Fair Board action. Always refer to the website for the most current fair book. Online fair book versions overrule the print edition of the fair book.

Fair Entry Deadline

Check the website for entry deadlines since we are using a two-year fair book. All exhibitors must enter online using FairEntry, please see the link on the website to enter or search for Dunn County Fair on faireentry.com. Check department regulations for any specific entry requirements. See the website, dunncountyfair.org, for additional updates.

How to Complete an Entry

Enter each article that you are bringing to the Fair either online or on the paper Open Class & Senior Citizen Entry Form. Entry forms should be sent to Dunn County Fair, 3001 US Highway 12 East, Suite 002, Menomonie, WI 54751, before the deadline (see website). No late entries will be accepted. Additional entry forms are available on the fair website.

Entry fees are \$1.00 per entry. All entry fees are due with the entry form.

Only one entry per lot. Check department regulations. For example, if an exhibitor is limited to five entries in a certain project, only five can be entered on the entry form.

Other Rules and Regulations

- Exhibitors in open class must be Wisconsin residents.
- All articles must be produced or made by exhibitor since the previous fair date. No entries are allowed by professionals or dealers.
- All open class entries may be brought in on Monday of the fair from 4:00 – 7:00 pm or Tuesday from 9:00 – 11:00 am. Open class entries are in the Fanetti Community Center building.
- Place exhibit tag on each entry. Tear off and retain the exhibit tag stub for pick-up of entry.
- Judging of all open classes, except beef, will be on Tuesday. Check judging schedule and times.
- Items entered in the wrong class, will be automatically dropped one ribbon.
- Open class entries are judged according to the regular system; only one 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th place will be awarded in each lot. Lots with more than 8 entries will be split for judging.
- Judges may select exhibits to receive an Award of Excellence ribbons.
- Every precaution will be taken to insure the safety of exhibits, but in no case will management be responsible for loss or injury to same.

Supervision of Exhibit Buildings and Liabilities

- The Dunn County Fair Board will endeavor to provide adequate care and protection to all exhibits for the duration of the fair. In no case shall the Dunn County Fair or any of its board members or superintendents be held responsible for any loss, damage, injury or deaths by disease, theft or from any other cause of any character, to any property or exhibit while same is on the Dunn County Fair Grounds, or any other time or place. Management hereby assumes no responsibility for any property being brought and kept on said grounds.
- Any exhibitor entering items in open class is asked to spend two hours volunteering in the open class exhibit area. A sign-up sheet will be available when you bring your entries.

Procedure for Release of Entries

- All exhibits must be left in place until Sunday. NO EXHIBITS WILL BE RELEASED WITHOUT THE EXPRESSED WRITTEN CONSENT OF THE FAIR BOARD. All exhibits are released at 5:00 pm on Sunday. All exhibits should be removed by 7:00 p.m. on Sunday from the exhibit buildings at which time the buildings will be closed.

Premium Checks

If you feel there is an error in your premium check, you must contact the Fair Office by November 30 of the same year for the Fair Board to consider an adjustment. After that date, no disputed checks will be considered. Premiums are listed within each Department.

Stalling and Equipment in the Barns

Stalls and animals must be kept accessible to the public while the barn is open. Individual areas may be blocked off for movement of animals to the show ring during the individual shows.

- Extension Cords
 - All cords must conform to manufacturer and Dunn County Fair recommendations for safety. No cords are permitted in the aisles or in public areas. The Dunn County Fair retains the authority to determine what is acceptable.
- Fans
 - All fans must conform to manufacturer and Dunn County Fair recommendations for safety. Overhead fans must be hung from the front wall on either side on the pen or stall. are permitted in the aisles or in public areas. The Dunn County Fair retains the authority to determine what is acceptable.
- Grooming Chutes/Grooming Stands
 - Chutes and stands are only allowed in the barn aisles 60 minutes before a show until 30 minutes after the show. Exhibitors using chutes or stands must store them out of the public walkways.

Unruly Animals

All animals must be under the control of the youth exhibitor to be eligible for entry in the show ring. For the safety of exhibitors and

spectators the superintendent will disqualify any animal if they present an unsafe condition.

Barn Procedures and Animal Areas

All exhibitors entering animals for show at the Dunn County Fair are responsible for cage, pen, and/or stall set-up prior to the fair, care of their animals during the fair, and cage, pen and/or stall tear down when removing animals from the fair.

- Exhibitors showing animals are required to feed, clean, and care for their animals. All exhibitors showing animals will be required to participate in barn duty as assigned by superintendents.
- No furniture or appliances are allowed in barn areas. Small tables and chairs are allowed.
- Exhibitors planning on staying at the fairgrounds overnight must complete and submit to the Fair Office the overnight consent form.
- All barns will be open to the public from 8:00 AM to 11:00 PM
- Follow specific manure handling policies for the barn your exhibits are housed in.
- Remove all belongings and assist in tear down of cages, pens, and/or stalls when removing animals from the fairgrounds.

Dunn County Fair Manure Handling Policy

The Dunn County Fair has developed and will enforce this policy. The Fair Board has established an agreement with a private composting business to have all the manure hauled to that site. The following guidelines must be practiced in all barns:

- All materials in manure must be ready for composting.
- Only straw, cornstalks and wood shavings will be allowed for animal bedding. Only horse and swine exhibitors may use sawdust.
- No wood chips, bark, coarse wood products, and metal of any kind, wire, plastic string, Styrofoam, or any other non-compostable materials may be in the manure or used to secure animals.
- Only twine will be allowed for securing gates. Goat and sheep exhibitors may use wire (since these species eat twine). The goat and sheep superintendents shall supervise the goat and sheep exhibitors who must remove all wire from the manure.
- During the fair, all animal waste must be placed into the dumpsters provided for manure disposal. Other items may not be placed into these dumpsters. Manure and bedding should never be placed into the regular trashcans.
- Superintendents on duty will inspect the bedding. If all the components are approved, the county will take the manure to the composting site. If the bedding is not approved, exhibitors will need to come back and haul out the manure and bedding.
- On the Sunday of the fair, exhibitors are expected to thoroughly clean their animals' areas and cages (and, if necessary, take down cages) in all buildings and place the manure into the proper manure dumpsters. The following exceptions exist:
 - Exhibitors in the small animal barn should make one large pile (which can be easily scooped by a loader) in the center of their barn.
 - Exhibitors in the cattle barn may leave their bedding in place; however, all gates, pens and steel fence posts must be removed. Please note that if a steel fence post breaks off, the area needs to be reported to the superintendent so that equipment used to work up the dirt floor is not damaged.

- If there are violations to these guidelines, the compost site may discontinue this service and all the exhibitors will need to haul all bedding and manure back to their own farms/homes. Individual exhibitors violating this policy may lose their fair premiums.

Animal Check-In Procedures

1. Vehicles carrying all livestock, feed, and tack, must enter using the North gate on 17th Street.
2. All exhibitors must complete the Animal ID and Check-in Information form before unloading.
3. Refer to the [Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin](#) for additional requirements and documentation needed.
4. Superintendents will complete a health and identification check before animals can be unloaded. For the safety of exhibitors and animals, any animal not meeting health and identification checks will be disqualified.
5. After unloading, all trucks and trailers must be moved to the parking lot. If you plan to leave the truck and trailer overnight on entry day, contact the fair office for permission and parking assistance. No trailers may remain on the grounds after entry day.

Chapter ATCP 160 – County and District Fairs

Please see the website for the complete set of ATCP 160.00 regulations and for any updates.

ATCP 160.01 Definitions – as used in this Chapter

1. "Breed class" and "breeding class" mean a specific breed within a class such as Holstein in the dairy class.
2. "Class" means a grouping in which exhibits may be entered, including an animal breed or age group for animal exhibits; a type of produce, crop or food; or a specific age, age group or educational grade level of exhibitor.
3. "Danish judging system" means a judging system that allows for multiple first, second, third and fourth class selections as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (b).
4. "Department" as it relates to the organizational structure of a fair, means an animal species, production group, or other principal classification of exhibits. As used in any other context, "department" means the state of Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection.
5. "Division" means one of 3 exhibitor group classifications for a fair and is limited to junior division, open division and senior citizens division.
6. "Entry class" means a class in which the fair allows exhibitors to submit entries.
7. "Exotic domestic animal" means an animal that is not a common farm animal.
8. "Lot" or "lot number" means the numerical designation assigned by a local fair for a specific category of exhibits within a class.
9. "Market class" means a class that includes animals of a certain weight for the breed class that can be sold for slaughter.
10. "Premium" means a monetary prize that a county or district fair awards to an exhibitor after judging all competing exhibits in the class to which the premium pertains.
11. "Regular judging system" means a judging system that allows for one first, second, third and fourth class selection as provided in s. ATCP 160.91 (4) (c).
12. "Self-determined project" means a project that meets all of the following criteria:
 - a. It is approved by the fair board.
 - b. It is subject matter is related to any of the junior fair departments 9, 10, 13 to 16, 18, or 20 to 29.
 - c. It does not fall into a defined entry class within any department.
 - d. It is carried out by a 4-H member enrolled in a designated 4-H project or alternative project that follows 4-H guidelines, or by a member of another youth organization that does equivalent work.

ATCP 160.02 Premium Requirements

1. General.
 - a. The state aid authorized by s. 93.23 (1), Stats, may be paid only on net premiums, which consists of total premiums paid less total entry fees received. The department may withhold state premium aid from any fair that does not enforce the animal health provisions required under Ch. ATCP 10 for all classes of livestock exhibited at the fair. State aid will be paid only on the premiums actually paid by bank check or draft.
 - b. No deductions may be made from premium money won by an exhibitor. Premiums may, however, be withheld where exhibition rules established by the fair association are violated. A written statement of violation shall be submitted to the department to justify action taken by a local fair.
 - c. Premiums offered shall be definite in amount. No decrease or increase in published premiums may be made because of the financial condition or the organization or for any other reason.
 - d. State aid may be paid on no more than 2 premiums awarded an exhibitor under one premium or lot number in open division individual livestock classes, except poultry and rabbits, and no more than one premium in all other classes, including poultry and rabbits.
 - e. No county or district fair may receive state aid for a premium awarded to any exhibitor in the open division if that exhibitor entered the same exhibit in the junior division at the same county or district fair. This paragraph does not apply if the exhibit was entered in the junior division only as part of a herd group, carcass class or performance class.
 - f. No state aid will be paid on the cost of ribbons, cups or trophy prizes or entertainment contests.
2. Premium Lists.
 - a. Premiums for which state aid is requested by county or district fairs shall conform to the uniform premium list and other requirements set forth in these rules. Fairs requesting state aid for net premiums shall submit to the department a printed copy of the premium list used at the fair, as required under s. ATCP 160.92 (3) (c).
 - b. The officers of each fair shall mail a copy of the premium list to other associations, societies, or boards conducting a fair in Wisconsin upon request.
 - c. Sections ATCP 160.1 through 160.07 and 160.91 shall be published in premium books used by the fair for which state aid is requested.
3. Entry Fees.
 - a. A county or district fair may charge an exhibitor an entry fee. The entry fee may not exceed 10% of the sum of all premiums offered to exhibitors in the same class for which the entry fee is charged. In lieu of an entry fee, a county or district fair may charge stall rents for horses, cattle, sheep, goats, swine, poultry, rabbits, or pets.
 - b. Exhibitors in department 35 shall not be required to purchase an exhibitor's ticket. Any other exhibitor may be required, if no entry fee is charged, to purchase an exhibitor's season ticket at a price not to exceed that charged for a non-exhibitor's season ticket.
4. Split Fair Dates.
 - a. For purposes of this subsection, "split fair dates" occur when a fair organization judges exhibits or contests and pays premiums at more than one time or at more than one location during the calendar year.
 - b. Except as provided under par. (c), the department may not pay state aid for a fair having split dates unless the department gives advance written approval for a split fair. The department may approve split fair dates only if the fair organization justifies the split dates based on extreme hardship. If the department approves split dates, all blue ribbon winners shall repeat their demonstrations or exhibits at the regular fair dates unless the department grants a hardship exemption. An exhibitor may use audio-visual media, still photography or an educational display to repeat the demonstration or exhibit.
 - c. The department may pay state aid for the following exhibits or contests in a fair having split dates, regardless of whether the department approves those split dates in advance:
 1. Clothing revue

2. Favorite foods revue
3. Rocketry
4. Shooting sports
5. Demonstrations
6. Dogs
7. Small animals
8. Other exhibits and contests that are similar to those identified in subs. 1 to 7

ATCP 160.03 Exhibition Requirements

A county or district fair shall meet all of the exhibition requirements of this section to be eligible for state premium aid.

1. No fair society or other organization sponsoring a county or district fair shall require an exhibitor to become a member of the organization in order to enter an exhibit at the fair, nor shall the sponsoring organization make any deductions from an exhibitor's premium as a donation to the society, or require an exhibitor in any way to make a donation to the society.
2. State aid may not be approved for out-of-state exhibits or for separate classes of local and non-local exhibitors. Aid may not be approved for payment of premiums to an exhibitor having an out-of-state address but claiming Wisconsin residency unless the fair secretary provides the department with an affidavit that the exhibitor's residence is geographically located within the state.
3. State aid may be paid only on articles or animals actually on display in an exhibit building or actually shown in the show ring on regular fair dates unless approval for split dates is obtained under s. ATCP 160.02 (4). State aid may not be paid on Dairy Herd Improvement Association records, transportation aid, production contests or other special educational exhibits unless prior approval is obtained under s. ATCP 160.04 (8).
4. State aid may not be paid on exhibits removed from the fairgrounds before 4:00 p.m. of the last day of the fair, or such other later time as may be specified by the fair, without prior approval of the department. Authority for earlier removal may be granted by the department in case of meat animal sales or other special classes, if requested before the beginning of the fair. In other hardship cases, approval may be granted by the local fair. Exhibits in dog obedience and small animal pet classes may be judged during the regular fair but are not required to remain present during the entire fair. The local fair may prescribe the length of time junior fair exhibitors of horses shall keep their animals on the grounds.

ATCP 160.05 Open Division; General Requirements

1. The total maximum premiums set forth for all places in any open division livestock class, excluding poultry and rabbits, may be divided into premiums for a greater number of places, but the maximum premium offered for any additional place shall not be higher than the maximum for last place in the class.
2. All animals in any open division class shall be owned by the exhibitor, except as provided in s. ATCP 160.09.

ATCP 160.06 Senior Citizens Division; General Requirements

1. The age of exhibitors in the senior citizens division is limited to persons 62 years of age or over.
2. Exhibitors in the senior citizens division may not enter identical items or articles in both the senior citizens division and the corresponding classes of the regular open division.

ATCP 160.07 Classes; General Requirements

1. Classes may be combined if the number of entries in several single classes is insufficient. If any classes are combined, state aid shall be limited to the maximum total premiums listed for a single class of animals, items or articles in that department.
2. Except as provided under par. (b), no county or district fair may receive state aid for premiums awarded for sexually intact male dairy cattle, beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses unless those animals are registered purebreds. Registered purebred status shall be documented by a certificate of registry from the appropriate breed association or society, or by a copy of the application for registration.
3. Paragraph (a) does not apply to dairy cattle exhibited at a county or district fair if a national breed association certifies that those dairy cattle are recorded in that breed association's qualified herd book which records the genealogy of that breed.

4. Any animal entered as part of a group class may also be exhibited in a class for individual animals.
5. Boars may not be entered as an exhibit in the swine department unless their tusks have been removed.
6. The age of an animal, for purposes of determining its entry class under this chapter, shall be determined as of the opening day of the fair.

ATCP 160.91 Judging Regulations

Judging Regulations

Judging shall be done at fairs by individuals who are registered with the department. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair; nor shall any person interested directly or indirectly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals in that department.

(1m) (a) An individual shall register by submitting to the department an application. The department shall register all individuals who qualify to be judges, including having the knowledge, training, or experience in the specific classes to be judged and adhering to ethical judging practices. The registration is valid for five years.

(b) An individual submitting an application after July 1 may not judge for the current fair year.

(c) A fair representative may request the department waive par. (b) in cases of unanticipated emergency situations.

(2) Each judge at a fair shall be provided with a copy of the fair's premium book or list of entry classes at least 7 days prior to the opening date of the fair.

(3) No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the class in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of perfection in the class.

(4) (a) Danish system judging may be used in the junior fair division. State aid may not be paid on premiums awarded under the Danish system in any other division. (b) When classes in the junior fair division are judged according to the Danish system, 4 group placings shall be awarded in any class. When there are less than 8 exhibitors in the class, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first 2 groups and not more than 6 in the first 3 groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the class, there shall not be more than 25% in the first group, not more than 50% in the first 2 groups, and not more than 75% in the first 3 groups.

(c) The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

(4g) When classes in the junior fair division are judged using the conference judging system, the judge shall use sub. (4) (b) and (c) to award placements in a class.

(5) If any class of exhibits at a fair is judged according to the regular system, the judges for that class may give only one first-place, one second-place, one third-place and one fourth-place award in that class.

Department 112 – Beef

Entry Fees:

- Entry fee \$20 per head. Late fee of \$10 will be applied after July 7th. The last day to submit online entries is July 27th. Entries are accepted the day of show \$30. You can edit your entries online until July 27th. Showmanship entry fee \$10.
- **All entries must be made via the [Showman](#) app, search for Summer Showdown.**

Show Schedule

- Arrival: 5-8 pm July 28th. Late arrival 5:30am-7 am July 29th. Animals must be in stall until Sunday, July 30th 12 noon.
- Please enter gates, check in, unload and prepare to park trailer. Blocks are required when parking your trailer. Limited space for trailers so they must be parked at Oaklawn Middle School. We

will be showing out of the indoor arena in cattle barn with 1 ring.

- Cattle must be stalled in barn
- Show Begins at 9:00 a.m.
- Order: Heifer/Steer Shows, Showmanship (Peewee 0-7, Junior 8-12, Intermediate 13-16, Senior 17-21)

General Rules

- Bring generators and electrical cords if you have them. Power is limited in the barn. You will be required to clean up and take home any bedding/debris around your equipment and generators. Beef Superintendent staff will monitor your trailer or stall area at departure.
- All animals are to be fed and shown by the exhibitor. Family members/other junior exhibitors may assist.
- Registration papers must be in the name of the exhibitor or in his/her parents or farm name. All purebred animals in each species must have registration papers to exhibit in purebred classes.
- Complete Animal ID and Check-in Form; form is on the Dunn County Fair website.
- No medicines/drugs may be given to an animal at the show without a vet and show chairman approval.
- Any animal showing symptoms of a contagious disease will not be permitted to show. No active warts or ringworm are allowed on cattle, a veterinarian will be on the grounds to assist show staff.
- All cattle must be polled or dehorned. Any cattle with horns or scur will be not be permitted to show.
- Any animal that has been altered by a surgical procedure will be disqualified.

Additional Beef Rules

- We will be showing out of indoor arena in cattle barn. Show preparation must be done within the immediate perimeter.
- Out-of-state exhibitors must provide a copy of health paper to the beef superintendent staff to retain for our records.
- This is a **"no-fit, blow and go"** show.
- Please bring extension cords (note power in barn is limited). If using generator, it must be outside the barn 5 feet from building with exhaust blowing away from building. Keep flammable materials away from generators.
- Shirt orders are available with show entries on the [Showman](#) app. A limited number of shirts and sizes will be available on show day.
- Commercial Heifers will be shown by age and breed.
- Steers will be shown by breed and/or weight. All purebred steers need papers to show in the purebred division.
- Check tattoos against registration papers before you leave home. If a tattoo does not match a registration paper, the entry will be moved to the commercial division.
- To our out of state exhibitors; here are some rules you should be aware of. You must have an 840 RFID tag or other state approved identification. You will not be allowed to show and will have to return home if you do not have proper ID on your health paper. Make sure your veterinarian is up to date with new regulations.
